

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In this age of technology and globalization, it is essential that we critically analyze our systems and the beliefs upon which they are founded.



OUR MISSION



The Berggruen Research Center at Peking University was established on December 19, 2018. Located at the heart of Peking University, the Center engages China's most outstanding thinkers to examine, share and develop ideas to address global challenges.

Intellectual themes for research programs are focused on frontier technologies and society, and issues involving digital governance and globalization. The Berggruen Institute has committed \$22.5 million to the Center, which funds a fellowship program, supports publications that feature the Center's major research focuses, hosts program activities such as lectures, workshops, symposia, and produces multi-media outreach programs.





Frontier Technologies and Society

The program brings together Chinese philosophers, scientists in artificial intelligence, robotics and life sciences, legal scholars as well as science fiction writers and artists to explore ways frontier technologies impact and reshape how we view humanity, the nature of life and examine their impact on human society and our relationships with machines and other beings.

PROJECT

AI Meets Chinese Philosophers

This program aims to support East-West collaboration and dialogues on philosophical considerations and ethical implications of challenges and opportunities arising from the development of artificial intelligence. We engage Chinese philosophers from the traditions of Confucianism, Taoism and Buddhism in discussion with artificial intelligence scientists. The book AI Meets Chinese Philosophers will be published in Chinese in early 2020 by CITIC Press Group.

Today's dominant intellectual framework of international affairs is shaped by realism and power politics. Notions of nation-state, national interest, zero-sum competition, and big power rivalry underlie these debates and inform policymaking. While these notions are helpful in analyzing the power balance of international affairs, they are inadequate for helping us understand the deeper motivations and aspirations driving, directing and shaping policy-making.

A closer look at embedded values, philosophical traditions and historical experiences will promote deeper cross-cultural understanding and allow the building of strategic trust among the world's great powers.

We started exploring the prevailing model of world governance from the cultural perspectives of China, India, Africa and the Muslim world by organizing international workshops, including the "Classical Indian and Chinese World Views" and Tianxia series.

GLOBALIZATION AND GEOPOLITICS Tianxia and Geopolitics

"Tianxia" (all-under-the-heaven) is a worldview taken from Chinese philosophy and history, focusing on inclusiveness, mutuality, inter-dependence and relationality for dealing with global matters.

This program explores whether the "Tianxia" system could be a possible framework for thinking about a new and evolving world order and a new model of world governance.

GLOBALIZATION AND GEOPOLITICS Transculture

Many misunderstandings between nations today come Scholars wonder if every culture has the right to observe from misreading each other's philosophical and cultural and question other cultures, while also being observed forces behind policy making. The concept of "reciprocal and questioned by others. anthropology" has been proposed for transcultural dialogue.

Together with partner China Institute for Innovation and Development Strategy (CIIDS), the Berggruen *Institute's 21st Century Council held its fourth* "Understanding China" conference in Guangzhou from October 26-28, 2019. The theme was China's plans for the next phase of "reform and opening up" and "the new globalization."

As the premiere program for the Berggruen Institute and its work in the area of Geopolitics and Globalization, the 21st Century Council was founded in 2010 as a forum to address the challenges faced

by both advanced and emerging countries in an interdependent but fragmenting world. The Council has been working with CIIDS and organizing regular "Understanding China" meetings with President Xi Jinping and other top leaders in Beijing throughout 2013, 2015, 2018 and 2019.
